ON MONDAY, June 19, at an extraordinary meeting of full council in front of about 300 residents (who weren't allowed to speak or ask questions), RBWM councillors considered whether to proceed with the latest Borough Local Plan (BLP). After more than two hours, a vote was taken and 33 councillors voted to proceed with the plan and 10 voted against. So, the motion was carried.

This was despite several neighbourhood plan groups, parish councils and residents' associations having sent an open letter to the leader of the council asking for a delay in proceeding with this plan so proper consultation and engagement could take place, and more than 1,700 residents having signed a petition with the same request.

And it was despite many parish councils and neighbourhood plan groups having submitted their concerns about this plan at some length during the previous consultation. But our councillors (or most

of them) aren't listening.

The local plan is now published and is out for consultation. It was formally published by RBWM as the 'Borough Local Plan 2017 Submission Version' on Friday, June 30, and an eight-week consultation period has commenced under Regulation 19.

Representations to this consultation should be on whether it meets the four tests of soundness set out in the Government's National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), as well as on whether it is legally compliant and has also complied with the 'duty to cooperate' with neighbouring authorities.

The four tests of soundness relate to whether the plan is positively prepared, justified, effective and consistent with national policy.

In our view, this does NOT preclude readers from raising issues which they raised during the previous consultation (Regulation 18) if they believe those issues are still valid and have not been addressed in this draft, AND from commenting on items that are in this plan that were not in the previous

So, what happens next? The plan can be found on the council's website and the closing date for representations is 5pm, on Friday, August 25.

We are preparing some guidance notes for those who may wish to use them to assist in their submissions. These will be available from the week commencing July 24.

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I am able to clarify that there is no limitation at the second stage - (so-called Regulation 19) as to what topics of the plan residents may comment upon. It may be necessary to make the same comment at multiple points in plan preparation if it is felt that the point(s) raised have not been addressed (although these should have been considered by the Authority even if they haven't been taken forward). The Regulation 19 stage is the first opportunity that anyone would have to request involvement in the hearing sessions for the Local Plan and to make comments on the Plan that the authority would like to adopt.

No 'political games' behind panel

He has now been reinstated to the Panel at the expense of Cllr Paul Lion (Con, Boyn Hill).
